#### **TAX HOLIDAYS AND EXEMPTIONS 2022-2024**

The 2022 Florida Legislature passed, and Governor DeSantis signed into law, nine sales tax holidays or temporary exemptions and a motor fuel tax exemption. **Impact of Covid and Remote Learning on Learning Gains**

**Florida was the first state to reopen.**

A comprehensive national study of the impact of remote learning found Florida avoided the dramatic losses in learning during the 2020-21 school year. The national [study](#) that came out last week was a collaboration between the Center for Education Policy Research [at Harvard University](#); [CALDER Center at the American Institutes for Research](#), which uses data to examine how student outcomes affect learning; [NWEA](#), a not-for-profit that develops student assessment tools; and [Dartmouth College](#). Here are some of the findings:

#### *Nationally*

- generally high-poverty schools spent more weeks in remote instruction and that these more disadvantaged schools suffered larger losses in academic achievement during the second school year affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.
- school districts that remained open and largely in-person lost relatively little ground, according to the study of test data from 2.1 million students in 49 states and the District of Columbia.
- high-poverty schools lost a half-year of achievement during the 2020-21 school year, about twice as much as low-poverty schools in the same district.

#### *Florida*

- Florida, [the first to order its schools open](#) for the 2020-21 school year, was noted as an outlier in the findings, as was Texas, which also opened schools earlier than most states. All but Florida school districts resumed in-person instruction when the 2020-21 school year started, sometime during the second half of August 2020.
- The data [the state submitted](#) to apply for American Rescue Plan funds show that Florida's Black and low-income students, as well as those with disabilities, suffered the worst decreases in achievement when comparing 2019, pre-COVID-19 test scores to 2021 data.

#### **Teacher Pay Raises Take Center Stage at Florida State Board of Education Meeting**

The Florida Board of Education on Wednesday heard reports from Florida school districts that had not finalized their plans for teacher pay raises. The board questioned district Superintendents on why salary increases in their districts did not meet the mandated October 2021 deadline. Presenters affirmed the importance of getting increases to teachers but outlined a series of processes and complications that led to delays in meeting the deadline. The districts where plans are delayed are Leon, Bradford, Brevard, Lee, Palm Beach, St. Johns and Florida A&M University's Developmental Research School. ##### **Cities and Counties compiling local Wastewater and Stormwater Reports**

On May 13 at 1 PM, the FWEA Utility Council and the Florida Office of Economic and Demographic Research (EDR) will convene a joint webinar on complying with [HB 53's needs analyses](#) for domestic wastewater. This webinar will provide an opportunity for domestic wastewater utilities to learn all they need to know on how to complete EDR's [Wastewater Template for Needs Analysis](#), which is due to the county in which the utility operates by June 30, 2022. Webinar leaders will also explain to county representatives how to appropriately compile and submit local reports to EDR by July 31, 2022. As part of this webinar, a utility representative will provide specific examples on how to interpret and respond to each reporting template question.
