Governor Issues Executive Order Delaying Tax-Payments

Governor Ron DeSantis signed Executive Order 22-242 to suspend deadlines for payment of property taxes in counties that have been impacted by Hurricane Ian. The EO extends to real property including personal homes and commercial property that was destroyed or otherwise rendered uninhabitable.

Governor To Call Special Legislative Session

Property Tax Relief and Property Insurance will be on the docket.

Gov. Ron DeSantis said Thursday he plans to call a special legislative session to provide property-tax relief to people affected by Hurricane Ian, with the session possibly addressing property-insurance issues. No specific dates have been mentioned other than it would be held prior to the end of the calendar year.

The Governor indicated his intention to time the special session so lawmakers can retroactively allow residents who sustained damage from Ian to benefit from a tax change approved in the 2022 legislative session. That change, effective Jan. 1, is slated to offer property-tax rebates on residential properties rendered uninhabitable by catastrophic events. The law creates rebates when residential properties are rendered uninhabitable for 30 days or more by catastrophic events. The executive order would delay property tax payments on personal and commercial properties destroyed or otherwise made uninhabitable in 26 counties designated for disaster assistance by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The Governor did acknowledge that giving property tax rebates to taxpayers, property owners would impact the revenue that funds essential services and that some type of provision would need to be made offset the lost revenue.

State Board of Education Revises Rule on approach to Mental Health Instruction

Program changes from *Mental and Emotional Health Education* to *Resiliency Education: Civic and Character and Life Skills Education*.

The State Board of Education has approved a rule amendment, that is "reframing and rethinking" the way mental health is taught in schools. The shift is an effort to move from the traditional mental health education model to a new model based on resiliency. The changes will focus on teaching the skills to learn how to navigate and overcome challenges. Initiative resources and required instruction will include:

- Updated character standards in the form of resiliency standards that include a focus on volunteerism, problem solving, critical thinking, compassion, and grit;
- A outreach effort to help inform students, parents, and teachers of resiliency support;
- Free curriculum available to educators and parents that ties back to the foundational resiliency skills; and
- Tools created specifically for parents interested in learning what resources are available to help their children.

The goal of the program is to equip students with the skills that will help them learn to persevere through life's inevitable challenges. Empowering kids to strive to overcome challenges while recognizing and celebrating the success in doing so.

The State Board adopted an amendment to its rule which revises references to the state's academic standards and updates the existing five-hour mental health education and character education components of required classroom instruction in grades 6–12. Aligning these two required components uniquely connects the concepts of student readiness, resiliency, and, when necessary, response and recovery.


