CareerSource Florida is currently engaged in processes to implement the Reimagining Education and Career Help (REACH) Act, a state law that took effect July 1, 2021. The legislation is aimed at strengthening access, alignment, and accountability of Florida's comprehensive workforce development ecosystem. The law takes an integrated, customer-focused approach to align workforce, education, and support services that are the backbone of the state's workforce talent pipeline. CareerSource Florida is engaging Chief Local Elected Officials to provide guidance and accountability to drive strategies and investments that respond to local workforce needs. One of the directives in the REACH Act is to reduce the number of local workforce development boards. CareerSource Florida is working with the Governor's REACH Office to evaluate the alignment of Florida's 24 local workforce development boards and identify options for consolidation to be considered by the CareerSource Florida Board of Directors, Governor Ron DeSantis and local leaders. Under the law, changes to the current alignment of local workforce development boards are intended to help maximize resources for direct services to job seekers, workers, and businesses as multiple layers of administration are eliminated to improve coordination, consistency, accountability and funding flexibility. The goal is for continuous improvement of the CareerSource Florida network that maintains or enhances high-quality employment and training services in every community.

# National Assessment Results Released

# Florida Students Achieve Highest Rankings Ever on National Assessments

The results of the 2022 <u>National Assessment of Educational Progress</u> (NAEP) have been released. In 2022, Florida's 4th and 8th grade students earned the state's highest ever rankings in each assessment and demonstrated historic achievement gap closure for at-risk students at all levels. Florida's Hispanic students, black students, and students with disabilities all scored in the top 10 in every category.

Although scores across the country fell, it appears clear that Florida students benefitted from in school instruction throughout the pandemic. Here's an overview of the results in Florida:

- 4thgrade students rank #3 in Reading and #4 in Math, achieving top 4 in both English and Math for the first time in state history.
- Florida is in the top 5 for average scale scores of **Hispanic students** across all grades and subjects
- Florida is in the top 5 for average scale scores of **students with disabilities** across all grades and subjects
- Florida is in the top 10 for average scale scores of **black students** across all grades and subjects
- **Students on Free and Reduced Lunch** are ranked in the top 10 for average scale scores in three of four tests and improved massively on the fourth:
- Florida boasts the narrowest achievement gap between **students with disabilities** and **students without disabilities** in all grades and subjects.
- Florida's achievement gap between **Hispanic** and **white** students is the narrowest in the nation in Grade 8 Reading.
- All of Florida's subgroups significantly outperformed their national peers in Grade 4 Reading.

# Grade and subject highlights include:

- Grade 4 Reading 3rd in the nation in average scale score up from 6th in 2019
- Grade 4 Mathematics Fourth in the nation in average scale score.
- Grade 8 Reading 21st in the nation in average scale score, up from 22nd in 2019.
- Grade 8 Mathematics 32nd in the nation in average scale score, up from 35th in 2019.

# NAEP Background

NAEP is a congressionally mandated program that is overseen and administered by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), within the U.S. Department of Education and the Institute of Education Sciences. Results are available for the nation, states, and 27 urban districts, and are used to provide critical information about student achievement and data for improving educational practices. The current NAEP assessments were scheduled for 2021 but were postponed one year due to the pandemic. The next NAEP results will be reported in 2024.

The meeting will come after the Florida Department of Health in July filed a petition seeking a rule-making process on the contentious issue of treatment for gender dysphoria. The petition proposed what is known as a "standard of care" that would prohibit patients under age 18 from receiving sex-reassignment surgery and puberty-blocking, hormone and hormone "antagonist" treatments. It also would require that older patients sign a consent form and then wait 24 hours before starting such treatments. 
