Local Appropriation Project Deadlines passed this week Project submission deadline in the House was Feb. 15 Project Submission deadline in the Senate was Feb. 17.

Over \$300 million Awarded for Resiliency Planning and Projects

- DEP awarded more than \$28 million through <u>128 planning grants</u> statewide to help local communities prepare for stronger storms, more-intense flooding and rising sea levels through 222 local government vulnerability assessments.
- Earlier this month, the Governor awarded \$275 million for 75 resilience projects with funding through Resilient Florida to protect communities from flooding and storm surges.

\$63.5 Million provided to 5 Panhandle Counties hit by Hurricane Sally in 2020

- DEO has announced that \$63.5 million was awarded to five Panhandle counties hit by Hurricane Sally in 2020. Sally's eye made landfall in Alabama but brought hazardous winds and rain to Bay, Escambia, Okaloosa, Santa Rosa and Walton counties. The grants are funded by the federal government through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery Program. The counties will receive:
 - \$13.5 million to restore business and economic activity through the Hometown Revitalization Program,
 - \$5 million for local workforce development boards through the Rebuild Florida Hurricane Sally Workforce Recovery Training Program, and
 - \$45 million to repair or replace damaged homes through the Housing Repair and Replacement Program.
