 Subcommittee will consider a constitutional amendment (HJR 31), filed by Rep. Spencer Roach, RNorth Fort Myers, and Rep. Tyler Sirois, R-Merritt Island, that seeks to move to partisan schoolboard elections in Florida. Reed Hall, House Office Building, the Capitol. The consequences of
 this proposal are uncertain, however, it will more increase the focus on party affiliation rather than
 the specific ideas of the candidate. Here's the staff analysis on the proposal.
- SCHOOL BOARD TERM LIMITS Tuesday, 1:30 p.m. The House Choice & Innovation
 Subcommittee will consider a proposal that will reduce the allowable terms for school board
 members from 3 terms to 2 terms Reed Hall, House Office Building, the Capitol. Here's the staff
 analysis on HB 477.
 - As proposed the proposals is a limitation on the local community to choose an individual
 to continue on the school board by reducing the allowable 4 year terms from 3 to 2 –
 restricting local school board members from serving for 12 years to 8 consecutive years.
 - Terms limits were rejected for several years until last year when the Legislature provided authority for 3 – 4 year terms. A total of 12 consecutive years. This bill will reduce that allowable time to serve from 12 to 8 consecutive years.

• 'SAVE OUR HOMES' CHANGE- Wednesday, 11 a.m. - The Senate Community Affairs
