Senate Proposal SB1110 Calls for County Commissioner Term-limits

Text of Proposed Term-limit Bill – Senate Bill 1110

Late Wednesday afternoon, Senator Blaise Ingoglia filed SB 1110 proposing to set term limits for county commissioners. The bill also includes a provision reducting the recently adopted 12 year term limit for school board members back to 8 years. The House companion bill (HB 477) does not include the provision dealing with county commissioner term limits but expect that an amendment will be filed as the House bill moves along through the process. Here's what SB 1110 states regarding Term limits of county commissioners —a person may not appear on the ballot for reelection to the office of county commissioner if, by the end of his or her current term of office, the person will have served, or but for resignation would have served, in that office for 8 consecutive years. Service of a term of office which commenced before November 8, 2022, will not be counted toward the limitation imposed by this section. The bill further states that the legislation supersedes any term limits imposed by a county charter.

Affordable Housing Legislation Ready for Senate Floor Action Link to Bill Information on SB 102

The Senate Appropriations Committee approved SB 102, a bill called the "Live Local Act." The bill is a wide ranging bill that includes incentives for private investment in affordable housing. The legislation encourages mixed-use development in struggling commercial areas, preempts local-government rules on density and building heights in certain circumstances and bars local rent controls. The bill provides \$711 million proposal intended to make housing more affordable for working Floridians. The bill provides \$252 million for the State Housing Initiatives Partnership, or SHIP, program and an additional \$100 million for the Hometown Heroes program, which is designed to help teachers, health-care workers and police officers buy homes. There is also an additional \$362.7 million for affordable housing that was

included in the state budget. The full Senate is expected to take up the measure during the first week of the legislative session.

CareerSource Board of Directors to Consider Realigning and Reducing Workforce Boards

<u>Future State Options Report Prepared for CareerSource Florida as a part of Phase Two of the Local</u>
Workforce Development Board Alignment Evaluation

The Board of Directors for CareerSource will meet Thursday morning in Tallahassee. One of the items on the agenda is to consider a report from CareerSource Consultants Ernst & Young LLP ("EY"). The Board will be presented with three options regarding the 24 workforce areas. 1 option will realign and reduce the number of board to 21. A second option would move to 19 local boards, and, the third option would reduced the number of boards to 16. The initiative is part of a requirement of the REACH Act passed in 2021. The REACH Act directed a reduction of the number of local workforce development boards for the purpose of:

- Eliminating multiple layers of administrative entities to improve coordination of the workforce development system.
- Establishing consistent eligibility standards across the state to improve the accountability of workforce related programs.
- Providing greater flexibility in the allocation of resources to maximize funds directed to training and business services.

<u>Jefferson County Officials Are Expressing Concerns with Realignment Proposal</u>

As of Tuesday, representatives of Jefferson County Commission, the school district, and the City of Monticello were expressing concerns that all of the realignment options move the county from their current workforce board. It is anticipated that representatives from the county will request that the CareerSource Board allow Jefferson county to stay in their current region.
