HB 1209 Economic Development by Shoaf – Up in House Commerce on Monday

Economic Development: Removes requirement that grants received by regional economic development organization under Regional Rural Development Grants Program must be matched in certain manner; revises percentage of certain project costs for which DEO may award certain grants; provides date after which Florida Development Finance Corporation may not enter into specified agreements; removes scheduled repeal of corporation; revises purposes for which certain awards may be provided; revises areas in which DEO may provide grants through Everglades Restoration Agricultural Community Employment Training Program; authorizes use of certain grant funds for certain purposes; requires DEO to set aside certain percentage of funds for certain purpose; prohibits DEO from awarding employer-based grants in excess of certain amount; requires DEO to prioritize awarding employer-based grants to certain training programs. Effective Date: July 1, 2023

SB 1482 Rural Development by Simon – On Senate Approps Subcommittee on Tuesday

Rural Development; Prohibiting certain agency agreements from requiring the expenditure of funds before reimbursement; specifying that funding provided under the Regional Rural Development Grants Program are not matching grants; revising the conditions under which an applicant to the Rural Community Development Revolving Loan Fund may retain repayments of principal and interest; revising the purpose of the Rural Infrastructure Fund; revising the percentages of total infrastructure project cost that the Department of Economic Opportunity may award through the fund, etc. Effective Date: 7/1/2023

SB 1664 Economic Development by Hooper - Approps Subcommittee on Tuesday

Economic Development; Requiring the Secretary of Economic Opportunity to appoint deputy secretaries and directors for specified divisions of the Department of Economic Opportunity; revising the list of local governments affected by Naval Support Activity Orlando; revising requirements relating to the Florida Rural Development Grants Program; specifying that the term "public infrastructure projects" includes projects for workforce housing; deleting the future repeal of provisions governing the Florida Development Finance Corporation, etc. Effective Date: 7/1/2023

Partisan Election of Members of District School Boards by Gruters Scheduled for Final passage when the Senate meets this week

Partisan Election of Members of District School Boards; Proposing amendments to the State Constitution to require members of a district school board to be elected in a partisan election, etc.

SB 1112

Middle School and High School Start Times by Burgess On Senate Ed Approps on Tuesday

Middle School and High School Start Times; Providing requirements for middle school and high school start times; requiring such school start times to be implemented by a specified date; providing district school board requirements, etc. Effective Date: 7/1/2023

HB 1343

Agriculture Lands by Tuck Scheduled for consideration this afternoon in House Infrastructure committee

Agriculture Lands: Prohibits counties from levying specified special assessments on lands classified as agricultural; provides exception; authorizes construction or installation of housing for migrant farmworkers on certain lands; provides requirements for such housing; exempts such housing from certain local government approval; prohibits county or municipality from requiring removal or relinquishment of agricultural land classification for certain lands; requires landowners to provide county or municipality with certain written notice regarding such lands. Effective Date: July 1, 2023

What's in the House Tax Relief Package

The House Ways and Means Committee released <u>HB 7063</u> the proposed House tax package for FY 2023-24. Here are some of the items in the proposal:

- Permanent sales tax exemption on certain baby/infant products and clothes.
- Permanent sales tax exemption on oral hygiene products.
- One-year sales tax exemption on certain Energy Star appliances such as refrigerators, clothes washers and dryers.
- 13-month business rent tax reduction from 5.5% to 4.5%.
- Two two-week Back-to-School Sales Tax Holidays on certain clothing, shoes, school supplies
 and personal computers. One sales tax holiday would be during July-August 2023, while the other
 would be during January 2024.
- Two-week Disaster Preparedness Sales Tax Holiday during May-June 2023 on specified disaster preparedness supplies.
- "Freedom Summer" Sales Tax Holiday from Memorial Day through Labor Day. Specified recreational activities and items will be exempted from sales tax during these three months.

• One-week "Tool Time" Sales Tax Holiday, which will exempt skilled trade equipment and tools from sales tax during September 2023.

Here Are the Tax Breaks Proposed by the Senate

This morning the Senate posted SPB 7062. It will be considered tomorrow morning in Finance and Tax. The bill reduces revenues in total by \$1,198.2 million, which is the sum of \$420.5 million (recurring), and \$777.7 million (pure nonrecurring in Fiscal Year 2023-2024 and reductions resulting from nonrecurring impacts in future years). Here's what the proposal does: e

Permanently exempts the sale of the following products from sales and use tax:

- Machinery and equipment used to produce renewable natural gas.
- Baby and toddler products.
- Diapers and incontinence products.
- Oral hygiene products.
- Firearm safety devices.
- Provides a 28-day "back-to-school" sales tax holiday over two separate time periods, from
- July 24, 2023, through August 06, 2023, and January 01, 2024, through January 14, 2024, for certain clothing, school supplies, learning aids and puzzles, and personal computers.
- Provides a 14-day "disaster preparedness" sales tax holiday from May 27, 2023, through June 09, 2023, for specified disaster preparedness items, supplies necessary for the evacuation of pets, and common household consumable items.
- Provides a 3-month "Freedom Summer" sales tax holiday from May 29, 2023, through September 04, 2023, for specified admissions, boating and water activity supplies, camping supplies, fishing supplies, general outdoor supplies, residential pool supplies, children's toys, and children's athletic equipment.
- Provides a 7-day "Tool Time" sales tax holiday from September 2, 2023, through September 8, 2023, for specified tools and safety equipment.

<u>Provides a 1-year sales tax exemption on the sale of:</u>

- Specified ENERGY STAR appliances.
- Gas ranges and cooktops.
- Increases the Strong Families Tax Credit limit from \$10 million to \$20 million.
- Provides an additional \$150 million in tax credits for brownfield rehabilitation for use in Fiscal Years 2023-2024 through 2027-2028.
- Creates a corporate income tax credit for the installation of graywater systems on residential property.
- Creates a corporate income and insurance premium tax credit for the rehabilitation of historic real property in Florida.
- Distributes \$27.5 million for 2 fiscal years to the Florida Agricultural Promotion Campaign Trust Fund, from which it will be further distributed to the Florida Thoroughbred Breeders' Association and two thoroughbred racing tracks within Florida to be used to promote thoroughbred breeding and thoroughbred racing in Florida.
- Exempts certain portions of Small Business Administration loans from documentary stamp tax and intangible personal property tax.
- Exempts certain notes by alarm system contractors from documentary stamp tax.
- Permanently increases the sales tax dealer collection allowance from a maximum of \$30 per return to \$45 per return.
- Prohibits special assessments on agricultural lands.

- Requires several local taxes, when renewed or increased by referendum, to be placed on the ballot in a general election held within 48 months before the effective date of the renewed or increased tax, and prohibits them from being placed on the ballot more than once during that time period.
- Clarifies that the ad valorem exemption for disabled veterans may be transferred to other properties at the discretion of the disabled veteran or his or her surviving spouse.
- Expands the ad valorem refund for the exemption on an existing homestead to no longer require the veteran to have been receiving the exemption on an existing homestead.
- Expands disabled veterans who purchase a new homestead in Florida after receiving the homestead exemption for surviving spouses of first responders killed in the line of duty to include surviving spouses of federal law enforcement officers.
- Clarifies that parsonages, burial grounds, and tombs, when owned by a public house of worship, are used for religious purposes, and thus, are not subject to ad valorem tax.
- Amends the ad valorem exemption for educational property to include property under a 98-year lease by an educational institution and property leased by an educational institution and used by it for educational purposes if the property was owned by the educational institution and received the exemption for at least 10 consecutive years in the past.
- Amends the automatic property tax refund provision for residential property rendered uninhabitable to not apply when the damage was caused by an event resulting in a federal disaster area declaration or a state of emergency.
- Freezes local communications services tax rates in place on January 1, 2023, until January 1, 2026.
- Delays the imposition of the natural gas fuel tax from January 1, 2024, until January 1, 2026.
- Clarifies that when calculating the penalty for underpayment with regard to corporate income tax, a taxpayer's donation to a tax donation program is included as a payment of tax.
