Getting to the crunch time on bills being heard! Here are reports on the bills that we are tracking. They are wordsearchable. ***Also note the last action reference*** – here's what that means:

- In Committee – means sitting waiting to be heard – not good at this time of session.
- On Committee Agenda – means the bills is still moving and has been scheduled to be heard.
- On Calendar – means the bill has passed committee assignments and is waiting to be scheduled for floor action.
- Received – means the bill has passed one chamber and has been sent to the other chamber.
- Approved by the Governor – means the bill has passed and signed by the Governor.

The State Social Services Estimating Conference has projected a 15.3% increase in the County Contribution of Medicaid growing \$285.6 million (the total contribution for FY 2022-23) to a new total amount of the counties' annual contribution of \$329.4 million for FY 2023-24. Budget Negotiations

Allocations and The Conference Process

With each chamber finalizing their respective proposals, the two chambers now will work on allocating how much of the available money will go toward each section of the budget for the coming year and work in conference committees to finalize an agreement. Issues that can't be agreed on by the Joint Budget Conference Committees are "bumped" to each chamber's Appropriations Committee chairs who try to work out the sticking points. In some cases, the differences may be decided by the House speaker and the Senate president. The result is called the Conference Committee Report, which is open for 72 hours before each chamber adopts and votes on the final version of the budget.

The Florida Education Funding Program

The House and Senate are taking significantly different approaches to the FEFP. The Senate is taking the more traditional approach using the existing formula. The House is making major structural changes. Who benefits? It depends – however, the changes being proposed in the House are a significant concern. The Categorical allocations that the House proposes to eliminate are beneficial to small districts with extra funding built into the base of many of the programs. Elimination of several major categorical funding and elimination of Sparsity will have significant long term impact on small districts.

The Senate proposal for the distribution of the FEFP is the one that should be supported.
