### Another Look at what's in the Disaster Relief Legislation

<u>CS/HB 1C</u> - *Disaster Relief* by Rep. Shoaf (SB 2C by Sen. Simon) provides additional funding for Hurricane Idalia recovery efforts. The Small County Coalition presented testimony in support of the legislation. Here are funding provisions in the legislation.

- \$30 million to the Division of Emergency Management (DEM) to cover the local matching requirements of the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Public Assistance grants to local governments in the Hurricane Idalia Disaster Declaration.
- \$50 million to DEM for the Hurricane Recovery Grant Program. This program provides funding for repair and recovery projects in local governments covered by the Hurricane Idalia Disaster Declaration. See message below from DEM Director Guthrie.
- An additional \$3 million to DEM to provide planning and design grants for new emergency operations centers in fiscally constrained counties.
- \$10 million to the Small County Outreach Program, for transportation projects within the Hurricane Idalia Disaster Declaration.

- \$181.5 million to the Department of Financial Services for the My Safe Florida Home Program, which provides home inspections and hurricane-hardening residential improvements.
- \$25 million to the Florida Housing Finance Corporation for the Hurricane Housing Recovery Program.
- \$5 million to the Department of Commerce to provide Rural Infrastructure Fund Grants to fiscally constrained counties impacted by Hurricane Idalia.
- \$75 million for low- or zero-interest loans to eligible agriculture and aquaculture operations.

• \$37.5 million in grants for timber operations impacted by Hurricane Idalia.

The bill also includes a number of tax relief provisions that will help local farmers.

- A provision relating to tangible personal property in a farming operation, that was rendered unusable for at least 60 days by Hurricane Idalia, be assessed at its salvage value for the 2024 tax rolls;
- A provision for sales tax refunds for fencing and building materials associated with Hurricane Idalia recovery efforts on agricultural property; and
- A provision for a fuel tax refund for shipments and debris removal related to Hurricane Idalia recovery.

### \$50 million Repair and Recovery Program for Hurricane Idalia Local Governments and School Districts Eligible

The Florida Division of Emergency Management is pleased to announce information on an anticipated \$50 million Repair and Recovery Program for Hurricane Idalia.

#### **Objective:**

A funding opportunity is expected to become available for hurricane repair and recovery projects within counties declared by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for individual assistance and public assistance (categories A-G) for Hurricane Idalia. The Division is authorized to approve requests for resources by local governments, independent special districts, and school boards, including charter schools.

Funds through this program can provide resources for the following:

- mitigation of local and county revenue losses and operating deficits;
- infrastructure repair and replacement, including road, sewer, and water facilities;
- beach renourishment;
- debris removal;
- Dredging of public waterways.

A local government may submit a request for resources to administer infrastructure repair, beach renourishment, and dredging of public waterways grants within the jurisdiction of the local government, provided that the grant program requires matching funds by grantees of at least 50 percent of project costs. The matching requirements for a project within a fiscally constrained county may be waived.

Program funds will be provided as grants for projects shown to be ineligible for funding from any other sources. All other funds provided through the Program will be issued as loans to eligible recipients. It will be the duty of each loan recipient to seek funding from all sources for which a project may be eligible, including but not limited to any available insurance coverage and funding through the FEMA Public Assistance process, and recipients will be required to demonstrate that an earnest effort has been made to recover funds from those sources for eligible projects. Recipients will be required to repay all loans received through the Program, up to the amount of any indemnification payments or other federal assistance received for eligible projects.

Projects for the mitigation of local and county revenue losses and operating deficits for jurisdictions will be considered when Florida Commerce funding from the Local Government Emergency Bridge Loan Program has been exhausted, or upon an applicant's denial of funding from that program by the Department. #### **Grant/Loan Management:**


The Repair and Recovery Program for Hurricanes Idalia will be managed through the Division of Emergency Management Enterprise Solution (DEMES). The Division's solution will have an application process and will require information to be submitted with the application. Examples of the additional information may include FEMA project worksheets, insurance claims, denials, determination memos, etc. The Florida Division of Emergency Management, in coordination with a contracted vendor, will provide two training sessions the week of November 13 - 17. Both trainings will be the same, you will only need to attend one session.
