The Florida House and Senate on Friday released proposed budgets for the 2024-2025 fiscal year. The Senate proposal (SB 2500) totaled \$115.9 billion, while the House proposal (PCB APC 24-01) came in just under \$115.55 billion.

- HIGHER AMENDMENT THRESHOLD Monday, 3 p.m. The House Ethics, Elections & Open Government Subcommittee will consider a proposed constitutional amendment (HJR 335), filed by Rep. Rick Roth, R-West Palm Beach, that would require approval of 66.67 percent of voters to amend the state Constitution, up from the current 60 percent. Reed Hall, House Office Building, the Capitol.
