# Governor Announces Plan for Special Session

At a press conference Monday morning, Governor Ron DeSantis announced that he will call the legislature into special session the week of January 27th to implement immigration policies that are anticipated from executive orders during the first week of the incoming Trump Administration. DeSantis said the call will not be limited to illegal immigration, and will include: lingering hurricane relief; condominium relief; and, reforming the petition and amendment process in Florida.

#### School Start Time Requirement Needs a Second Look

The Florida Legislature requires that no later than July 1, 2026, the instructional day for all public and charter middle schools must begin no earlier than 8:00 a.m. and no earlier than 8:30 a.m. for high schools.

# Staff Analysis of Start Time Legislation

District school boards are required to inform its community, including parents, students, teachers, school administrators, athletic coaches and other stakeholders about the health and safety impacts of sleep deprivation on middle and high school students and the benefits of the later school start times. District school boards must discuss local strategies to successfully implement the later start times with the community, including parents, students, teachers, school administrators, athletic coaches and other stakeholders.

#### School Start Time Survey

Small School Districts are currently being surveyed on the status of implementation of the start time requirement. Here is some of the initial feedback –

- Concern regarding the impact on school transportation and supervision of students in the afternoon.
- Youngest students who live in the most rural areas will be outside in the darkness waiting on the bus.
- Many families use older siblings to watch younger ones in the afternoons.
- Many of our high school students work in the afternoons.
- Current shortage of bus drivers

- Limited availability of childcare facilities in rural districts
- Difficult for parents to align their work schedules with the new school hours.
- conflicts for students who are expected to help with farm work before school or for parents who need to manage schedules around early-morning agricultural tasks.
- parents work times require them to leave home prior to 7 AM in the morning.
- Impact on school extra curriculars.
- Starting later does not reduce sleep deprivation.
