Supreme Court Rules to Allow Debbie Mayfield to run for vacant Senate seat. The Supreme Court sided with Debbie Mayfield – rejecting the Secretary of State's ruling that the constitutional eight year term limit did not apply to Mayfield who had previously served 8 consecutive years in that House and 8 consecutive years in the Senate. Mayfield had filed to run for the Senate seat being vacated by Randy Fine who is resigning from the Senate to run for Congress. The court ruling will clear the way for Mayfield to be on the ballot for the vacant seat.

Here's a Lightning Round on Issues

Ag. Commissioner Simpson Proposes Farm Bill Bill will include provision allowing local control over farm-based solar projects. This week Agriculture Commissioner Wilton Simpson announced plans for a 2025 Florida farm bill. The new farm package is expected to cover a wide range of agricultural and regulatory issues, including provisions allowing local control over farm-based solar projects, preventing banks from discriminating against farmers based on environmental policies, updating concealed weapon permit procedures, increasing penalties for stealing checks from mailboxes, and requiring schools to provide facilities for 4-H and Future Farmers of America programs.

<u>Sovereign Immunity HB 301 - Suits Against the Government</u> House Civil Justice and Claims Subcommittee next Wednesday at 9:30 in 404 HOB <u>Staff Analysis of HB 301</u>

This bill will have an indeterminate, significant negative fiscal impact on state and local governments. HB 301 increases the existing caps on the recovery of awards against a governmental entity. For a claim that accrues between October 1, 2025, and September 30, 2030, the cap is increased to \$1,000,000 per person from \$200,000 and the cap for multiple claims or judgments arising out of the same incident is increased to \$3,000,000 from \$300,000; the bill provides for one automatic increase in the caps for claims accruing on or after October 1, 2030. The limitations of liability in effect on the date the claim accrues apply to the claim.

The bill permits a subdivision of the state to settle a claim or judgment in excess of the caps without requiring the subdivision to seek further action by the Legislature.

The bill prohibits an insurance policy, beginning October 1, 2025, from conditioning the payment of benefits or the coverage of liability on the enactment of a claim bill. The bill also revises certain statutes of limitation and presuit procedures for certain types of claims against government entities.

DeSantis Calls for Revisions to Intrusive Inspections of Boaters

Gov. Ron DeSantis wants to halt law-enforcement officers from using boat-safety inspections of "people that are acting responsibly" on Florida waters. The proposal would require a change in a state law that allows lawenforcement officers to pull over boaters for safety inspections when no probable cause or suspected violations have occurred. "By eliminating unwarranted vessel inspections without probable cause, we believe (Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission) officers should better allocate resources and time in cases where there's a clear need for intervention," DeSantis said Under the proposal, the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission would be directed to work with county tax collectors to establish a boater decal that could be obtained at registration to "reassure law enforcement that the boater has done the due diligence of inspecting and maintaining proper boater safety requirements."

Proposals will Increase Homestead Exemption

These bills will have a negative fiscal impact on state and local governments

HB 357 - Property Tax Exemptions has been filed in the House by Representative <u>Chamberlin</u>. The bill proposes a constitutional amendment to create tax exemptions for real property and to set an implementation schedule. The following are among numerous provisions in the bill:

- Implements a \$25,000 exemption on property assessed for tangible personal property tax.
- Introduces a new \$100,000 exemption from assessed value of real property for all levies.
- Specifies that the real property exemption outlined takes effect on January 1, 2027.

In the Senate, Sen. <u>Blaise Ingoglia</u> plans to file a constitutional amendment offering homeowners property tax relief by increasing the homestead exemption to \$75,000. Gov. Ron DeSantis has also called for the tripling of homestead exemptions. The reduction in the assessed value of homes would lessen the property taxes charged by counties and municipalities. "We need to limit even further property tax rates," DeSantis said. "We should be tripling the homestead exemption to make sure that our primary homeowners are protected." Ingoglia's proposal should be filed within the week.
