Action on Major Legislation

House and Senate differ on substantive legislation

The Budget

For the session to end on time – the budget must be on the desk of legislators by next Tuesday evening. Although no conference committees have been formally established the conference process - action is going on behind the scenes. House and Senate budget chairs and legislative leaders need to agree on "allocations" within which the budget must adhere to. If legislators are unable to finish the budget by Tuesday they may work through Friday and come back the next week to adopt the Conference report.

<u>Staff Analysis of House Tax Package - HB 7033</u> Impacts Sales Tax Revenues Transfers Tourist Development Taxes to County Commission Requires reduction of Ad Valorem equivalent to TDT revenue Repeals the Opt Out Provision in the Live Local Law **Summary**

• Sales Tax Rates - *The bill reduces the general rate of Florida's sales tax,* which has been 6% since 1988, by 0.75 In addition, the bill reduces all other sales tax rates by the same 0.75%: Staff estimates the total

recurring state impact of the bill in Fiscal Year 2025-26 to be -\$4,925.6 million, of which -\$4,898.2 million is on General Revenue and -\$27.4 million is on state trust funds.

- Tourist Development Taxes The bill provides that beginning July 1, 2025, all TDT revenues are available to counties for any public purpose, rather than being limited to the current authorized uses of TDT. Counties are responsible for the continued payment of any debt service or existing contracts related to TDT levies. Beginning in 2026, a credit against county ad valorem taxes is to be applied to property tax bills that, in total, equals the prior year's TDT collections less any revenue needed for debt service or to continue any contract in effect on July 1, 2025. The credit on bills may either be proportionate shares of the TDT collections for all county taxpayers, or can be allocated among certain categories of taxpayers according to an ordinance adopted by the Board of County Commissioners. All tourist development councils are dissolved December 31, 2025. Tourism promotion agencies may continue if affirmatively extended by local governing boards. (Section 4)
- Value Adjustment Boards The bill amends s. 194.032, F.S., to allow any party to a VAB hearing to appear telephonically, by video conference, or by other electronic means. The bill also requires the VAB to provide sufficient equipment to allow clear communication and to create any necessary hearing records.
- Affordable Housing The bill repeals the opt out provision for local governments from the affordable housing "missing middle" exemption from ad valorem taxes found in s. 196.1978(3), F.S., thereby making the Live Local Act's missing middle exemption mandatory for all jurisdictions. The bill specifies that any election to opt out made by a local government on or before July 1, 2025, will continue for the original term of the election but may not be renewed.

<u>The Senate Tax Plan - SB 7034 –</u> <u>Major Components :</u>

- Permanently exempts from the Sales and Use Tax:
 - Certain clothing and shoes with a sales price of \$75 or less per item.
 - o Gold, silver, or platinum bullion, or any combination, with a sales price of less than \$500.
- Temporarily exempts from the Sales and Use Tax:
 - "Disaster Preparedness" items and supplies necessary for disaster preparation and the evacuation of pets from May 15, 2025, through May 31, 2025.
 - Specific admissions, boating and water activity supplies, camping supplies, fishing supplies, general outdoor supplies, residential pool supplies, and certain electric scooters from June 1, 2025, through July 31, 2025.
 - "Back-to-School" items including bags and backpacks, school supplies, learning aids and puzzles, and personal computers and computer accessories from August 1, 2025, through August 10, 2025.
 - Certain tools and safety equipment from August 29, 2025, through September 7, 2025.
 - "Hunting Season" items including ammunition, firearms, bows, crossbows, and certain accessories for firearms or bows and crossbows from September 8, 2025, through December 31, 2025.
- The bill makes the following changes to the Ad Valorem Property Tax:
 - Limits the assessment of tangible personal property owned and operated by a citrus packinghouse or processor to its salvage value for the 2025 tax roll if the property is no longer used in the operation of a facility due to the effects of citrus greening.
 - Extends the length of time lands may be classified as agricultural to 10 years after the date of execution of a compliance agreement. For lands replanted in citrus, the bill also extends to 10 years the length of time a de minimis assessment may be provided.
 - Requires certain value adjustment boards to allow petitioners to appear remotely at a hearing.
 - Allows a taxpayer that received a final action by the value adjustment board to bring an action within 30 days after recertification by the property appraiser if the roll was extended
 - Aligns property appraiser requirements that must be met when an applicant's exemption application is denied.
 - Exempts property used for educational purposes when any portion of real property is used by a child care facility that has achieved Gold Seal Quality status.

Where are these bills?

<u>**Rural Renaissance**</u> – Senate bill 110 has passed the Senate and is in the House. The House has split the components of the SB 110 into 3 bills. HB 991, 1267, and 1497. We have analyzed the House Bills and all of the components from SB 110 are in the House Bills. Nothing is dead at this time. However, when the House adopts the three bills they will be sent to the Senate where some action will be taken to accept or amend the provisions and return the bills to the House. Don't count President Albritton or the Senate out in terms of dealing with this priority. The Small County Coalition has called on the House and Senate to move the provisions of the Rural Renaissance package in toto. Small County Coalition Support for Rural Renaissance legislation We are keeping the small county House and Senate members advised of the status of these bills.

<u>School Start times</u> – bill has passed the Senate and is on the House Special Order – all it needs is passage in the House.

<u>Term Limits for County Commissioners and School Board members</u> – bill is in very critical condition. Has not been considered in the Senate.

<u>Sovereign Immunity</u> – Bill is in very critical condition – hasn't moved in the Senate.

SB 0248 Student Participation in Interscholastic and Intrascholastic Extracurricular Sports by Simon Sports by Simon

Student Participation in Interscholastic and Intrascholastic Extracurricular Sports; Providing that an activity or a sport must meet specified requirements; specifying conditions for a home education student to participate in interscholastic athletics; revising the criteria a private school student must meet to participate in a sport at a Florida High School Athletic Association (FHSAA) member school, etc. Effective Date: 7/1/2025

HB 0875 Educator Preparation by Rizo

Educator Preparation: Provides for future repeal of provisions relating to uniform core curricula for certain teacher preparation programs; revises requirements for certain teacher preparation programs, certain personnel requirements, postsecondary educator preparation institutes, teachers serving as mentors through teacher apprenticeship program, teacher candidates, teacher certification requirements, specified professional learning systems; requires DOE to establish flexibility for school counselor requirements; removes requirement for passing score on specified examination for certain candidates for certification as educator beginning on certain date; provides requirements for hiring of certain nondegreed teachers of fine & performing arts; establishes Coaching for Educator Readiness & Teaching Certification Program; provides for future repeal of professional learning certification programs & professional education competency programs; & establishes Florida Institute for Teaching Excellence at Miami Dade College, subject to appropriation. Effective Date: July 1, 2025

HB 0969 Reporting of Student Mental Health Outcomes by Cassel

Reporting of Student Mental Health Outcomes : Requires OPPAGA to submit initial specified evaluation to Governor & Legislature by specified date; requires office to submit final specified evaluation to Governor & Legislature by specified date; provides evaluation requirements. Effective Date: upon becoming a law

HB 1009 Religious and Patriotic Expression in the Public School System by Daniels

Religious and Patriotic Expression in the Public School System: Requires specified information to be provided to certain persons relating to religious expression & liberties in public schools; revises requirements for display of state motto, "In God We Trust," in certain schools & buildings. Effective Date: July 1, 2025

HB 1115 Education by Valdés

Education: Requires that certain surtax revenues which are shared with school districts must also be shared with charter schools on proportionate basis in accordance with certain provisions; provides school district reporting requirements relating to specified revenues shared with charter schools; revises provisions relating to charter schools & schools of hope. Effective Date: July 1, 2025

HB 1255 Education by Trabulsy

Education: Revises provisions relating to critical teacher shortage areas, Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children, Florida School for Competitive Academics, use of certain educational funds, emergency opioid antagonists, corporal punishment, background screening requirements for private schools, prekindergarten programs, students of military families, K-12 courses, instruction, standards, & bencharks, New Worlds Tutoring Program, & educator certifications. Effective Date: July 1, 2025

HB 1267 Education by Busatta

Education: Revises provisions relating to public postsecondary boards, presidents, presidential succession plans, textbooks & instructional materials, & graduation requirements; Institute for Freedom in the Americas; & K-12 educational facilities, early warning system, district school board real property, capital outlay, student reading & mathematics deficiencies, schools of hope, New Worlds Reading Initiative, student report cards, & school grades; & establishes Rural Incentive for Professional Educators (RIPE) Program. Effective Date: July 1, 2025

HB 1607 Cardiac Emergencies by Yarkosky

Cardiac Emergencies: Requires, rather than authorizing, school districts to provide training in basic first aid to certain students; provides requirements for such training; requires each public school to develop plan for urgent life-saving emergencies (PULSE) for specified purposes; & provides requirements for school, staff, & defibrillator use & storage. Effective Date: July 1, 2025
