#### FEFP 3<sup>rd</sup> Calculation

The 3<sup>rd</sup> calculation found a drop of 46,455.88 in FTE resulting in a reduction of 231,028,166 appropriated by the Legislature. Over 45 of the 67 school district enrollments dropped. Unless some provision is made to help offset the funding loss - \$231 million appropriated in the FEFP will revert.

### **Where Bills Stand in the Legislative Process**

This section provides a snapshot of general bills at key points in the legislative process, highlighting whether bills have advanced through committee review or remain pending. As of the 30th day of the session, the table distinguishes among bills that have not yet been heard in any assigned committee, bills that have received committee consideration, and bills that have advanced beyond committee to pass at least one chamber.

Bills that have not been heard in committee are not formally considered dead; however, limited movement at this stage of the session generally indicates a reduced likelihood of further advancement. Together, these categories provide transparency into legislative momentum and help illustrate where proposals currently stand. Some **93** bills in the "No Committee Activity" stage are on an upcoming agenda, or were Temporarily Postponed.

The 2026 Regular Session is at the half-way point, lawmakers are yet to send Gov. Ron DeSantis a bill that's passed both chambers. High profile issues, including property tax cuts, medical freedom and artificial intelligence regulation sought by the governor, rural economic development legislation pushed by Senate leadership, and a change in the age for buying guns that has passed the House, are yet to find consensus and a clear path to passage in both chambers.

House has passed **24** bills, including one of the most-tracked bills (**HB 145**) that would increase sovereign immunity liability caps. The House is yet to take up a Senate-passed bill.

The Senate has passed **25** bills, including the signature priority of Senate President [Ben Albritton](#), the so-called "[rural renaissance](#)" legislation (**SB 250**), passed in mid-January, that seeks to boost state financial assistance to local governments in rural areas for education, housing, health care, communications and transportation infrastructure. That bill is among the most-tracked Senate bills this session.

### **What Has Not Been Heard?**

On the other side of the equation, there are **897** bills not yet heard in any of their assigned committees at the halfway point, posing a severe challenge for those proposals to get a final vote before the end of the session. Some committees are winding down their work. For example, the chairmen of the Senate Transportation and Senate Community Affairs Committees both said this week their committees would likely not meet again this session. Bills still needing approval from those panels would have to be

withdrawn from the committee in order to get a hearing on the floor, which doesn't happen that often, which means most of those bills won't pass this year. As the number of committee meetings dwindles, more bills will have a difficult time reaching final passage – though none can be really considered dead until the session actually ends.
